- 5. Antiochus Soter was succeeded by Antiochus Theus who continued to war with Ptolemy Philadelphus until "the end of the years." v. 6a
- 6. Ptolemy offered Berenice, his daughter, to Antiochus Theus as a peace bribe. v. 6b
- 7. When Ptolemy Philadelphus died, Berenice could no longer "retain

the power of her arm", so, Antiochus Theus put her away and took back his original wife Laodice, who soon thereafter poisoned her husband whom she couldn't trust, thus fulfilling this verse 6b.

- 8. Laodice's son, Seleucus Callincus, succeeded Antiochus Theus and put Berenice and her son to death, along with those who helped her. v. 6c
- 9. After Berenice's death, her brother Ptolemy Euergetus, who ruled in Egypt, made a savage attack on Syria and carried back to Egypt much wealth. vs. 7-8
- 10. After sometime the king of Syria, Antiochus the Great, made a retaliatory attack upon Egypt at the fortress of Gaza, which was under the control of Ptolemy Philopater, son of Ptolemy Euergetus. Date: B.C. 218. vs. 9-10
- 11. Ptolemy Philopter defeated Antiochus at Raphia, not far from Gaza, B.C. 217. vs. 11-12
- 12. Thirteen years later, after the death of Ptolemy Philopter, Antiochus launched a great attack upon Egypt expecting an easy victory. v. 13
- 13. Philip, king of Macedon, along with some wicked Jews in Palestine, joined Antiochus in the assault against the infant king, Ptolemy Epiphanes. Antiochus turned against the Jews, thus causing their "fall". v. 14
- 14. Antiochus' first step was to take Palestine which under the control of Egypt. He succeeded and started for Egypt. vs. 15-16
- 15. The Egyptians received help from the Romans, thus resulting in a peace agreement using the daughter of Antiochus, Cleopatra, who later would become the wife of Ptolemy Epiphanies, as a binder in the agreement. v. 17
- 16. Cleopatra betrayed her father's scheme and allied with her husband, thus provoking her father to launch a navy attack against the Romans in the Isles of Asia Minor. He was defeated at Magnesia, B.C. 190 by Scipio Asiaticus, the prince mentioned in the prophecy. v. 18
- 17. Antiochus returns home to attempt a peace agreement which became monetarily very costly for him. While on an attempt to raise money in the Eastern Provinces, he was slain in the Temple of Bel Elymais. v. 19
- 18. Antiochus the Great was succeeded by his eldest son, Selecus Philopter, who attempted to raise the necessary tribute money owed by his father. In this attempt, he tried to confiscate the treasures from the temple in Jerusalem, only to be mysteriously poisoned shortly afterward. v. 20

Again, I believe this is true also because these preachers and writers have just not felt inclined to study these because of the lack of personal and practical application. So, this third volume is somewhat brief.

But, I do need to tell you that in the remaining volumes of this short series, there will be an enormous amount of sermon outlines from the New Testament. Therefore, I do hope that if I live long enough to get these additional volumes completed, you will find the time to study and enjoy them, and maybe even preach or teach them to those in your church or churches where you are presently ministering. So, thank you for the privilege of sharing these expository outlines with you, and I pray that God may have blessed your lives and ministry for taking the time to read them. Now, let me move on to the other volumes ahead from the New Testament. May God richly bless you for your diligence to study God's precious and infallible Word!
